Key Facts: The number and distribution of people with disabilities is not known. However, benefit agency data gives some indication of the size and whereabouts of those people in receipt of disability benefits. This data, based on a snapshot of claimants in May 1998, indicates that Bridlington contains the largest concentration of severely disabled claimants of working age, where they account for approximately 1 in 5 of all residents under pensionable age. These wards also rank amongst the top 20% most income deprived wards in the country. Overall, just under half, 46%, of claimants in this authority are residents of rural and semi-rural towns and villages. Access to key services in these rural areas has traditionally been poor, placing this group of disabled people at risk of social isolation and exclusion from essential services.
