Key Facts Low income is closely linked to a number of undesirable outcomes for children, including poor health, low educational attainment, juvenile crime and poor employment prospects. This index represents the percentage of children under the age of 16 dependent on means-tested benefits within each ward, including those in low paid employment who are claiming Family Credit. According to this measure, more than half of all dependent children in the city, 52%, are dependent on means-tested benefits, of which more than a third are children on poor working parents. In the Noddle Hill area more than four out of five children are dependent on means-tested benefits. Indeed this ward ranks ninth out of 8414 English wards on this measure.
