Key Facts: In some agency contexts, the term adult refers to people aged 16-64, whilst in others adulthood is generally defined as beginning at 18 years of age. In order to provide denominators which are useful to all agencies, (for example, for PAF or RAP indicators), we have included 16-64 year olds in the set as well as more detailed tables of people aged 65 years and older. The wards are ranked by rate of growth in this adult population between 1991-99. As the table shows, those areas where the greatest falls have occurred rank amongst the most deprived wards in the country. If this trend continues their share of the working age population will fall even further, suggesting that the population may have little to offer in terms of the availability of informal care for their most vulnerable residents.
