Key Facts

Exclusion from employment is acknowledged to be one of the main causes of poverty and social exclusion in this country. People who are not in work are more likely to suffer ill-health, anxiety and depression and are more likely to die prematurely. Children who live in workless households are less likely to eat a healthy, balanced diet, are more likely to smoke in later life and are more likely to suffer from accidental injuries, (DSS, 1999). The total number of people excluded from employment through sickness, illness, disability or unemployment is estimated to be in the region of 11,700 in this authority, or approximately 17% of the working age population. The highest rates were found in North East, Marsh and South Wards, where approximately 1 in 4 residents of working age are excluded from employment. The wards shaded in grey rank amongst the top 20% most deprived in the country on this measure. Currently we do not know how many people are unable to work due to their caring responsibilities. However, national research suggests that the local figure may be somewhere in the region of 4000 people in this authority. See definitions for information on the construction of this index.
